The seminar will consider what are—and are not—some of the key issues, and lessons from past experience, in strengthening resource mobilization in developing countries. It will report and draw on recent empirical and theoretical work in the area, and provide an opportunity to revisit some overarching themes on strategic reform advice.

Michael Keen is Senior Advisor in the Fiscal Affairs Department of the International Monetary Fund, where he was previously head of the Tax Policy and Tax Coordination divisions. Before joining the Fund, he was Professor of Economics at the University of Essex. He was awarded the CESifo-IIPF Musgrave prize in 2010, was the elected President of the International Institute of Public Finance from 2003 to 2006. He has served on the Board of the National Tax Association in the U.S., was a founding editor of *International Tax and Public Finance*, and has served on the editorial boards of *American Economic Journal: Economic Policy*, the *Review of Economic Studies* and many other journals. He has led technical assistance missions to nearly thirty countries on a wide range of issues in tax policy, and consulted for the World Bank, European Commission, and the private sector. Recent publications appear in the American Economic Review, Economic Policy, the Journal of Public Economics, Journal of Development Economics and the National Tax Journal.
